Recording Oral Traditions

On May 14 from 5 to 7 p.m. at City Hall, the Anoka County Historical Society (ACHS) will host a story-gathering workshop, equipping you with the tools to record a community conversation in celebration of the 75th anniversary of Circle Pines.

Creating an oral history means collecting and preserving firsthand accounts from individuals about their experiences and perspectives on events, places, or cultural practices. To make this project successful, we need to gather people who have lived in Circle Pines over the last 25 years. This focus will help us build upon the information collected for the 50th anniversary, which, as it turns out, took place in 2000. Remember, just because you lived through history doesn't mean it isn't worth saving!

The first step is to brainstorm friends, family, community leaders, educators, or civic workers who have made a significant impact in the city, contributed to its growth or changes, or have an interesting story to share.

Next, we'll consider each person's specific role in the community and develop questions that will draw out the information we want to preserve. Examples of this could include:

- "Can you describe your memories of [specific event]?"
- "What was life like during [specific time period]?"
- "How did your community respond to [specific situation]?" Finally, we will practice interviewing each other. This will fo-

cus on introductions, asking open-ended questions with follow-up inquiries (essentially, being curious about what the person just said), and resisting the urge to insert our personal experiences into the recording. It's more complicated than you might think to sit and listen with an open mind!

Before you leave the workshop, you'll receive a packet of tools to help guide conversations aimed at preserving the recent history of Circle Pines. This will include:

- A copy of the ACHS "Story Gathering Form" with question prompts
- Links to online resources for creating oral histories
- · Examples of oral history transcripts

Home can mean many things to many people. Describing that concept often involves sharing stories of experiences that have shaped the community we all share. With contributions from everyone, the future narrative that people will reference should be more complete and honest.



This is a view from the Circle Pines water tower, taken in the late 1950s by Rienald Schrooten. This photo looks to the north; in the foreground is Old Highway 8, now known as Lake Drive. Then you see the backyards of the houses along East Road; the fire/police station was off the left of the photo. The houses farthest to the left are located on Pine Drive, followed by Circle Drive and then Inner Drive; here, you can see the open area that was and still is Inner Park. In the back, you can see the first school being built, which is actually in Blaine, not Circle Pines. Centennial High School was dedicated on March 7, 1958. Way in the background are the houses of Lino Lakes.

Everything will be accepted **except** for household hazardous waste, recyclables, and yard waste. Some items may have a fee.

for Circle Pines residents. Yard waste is identified as leaves, grass clippings, garden wastes, weeds, soft-bodied green plant materials, pine cones and needles, acorns and residential quantities of sod. Yard waste carts are **not** included in this event.

Yard waste must be free of garbage and in compostable bags. Please have your compostable bags at the curb by 6 a.m.



Ilicit Discharge Detection & Elimination

Storm sewer systems carry water directly into our lakes, rivers, and wetlands. If anything other than stormwater enters the system, it is an illicit discharge. Substances

can include oil, chemicals, sediment, and more.

Tips for residents:

- Take used oil to a recycle center or a fast Oil-Change business.
- Revegetate bare or eroding areas of your lawn.
- Return old paint to the store where you purchased it.
- Secure your trash when placed on the street.
- Take all old chemicals, including paints and automobile fluids, to Household Hazardous Waste drop-off facility.
- Do not pour fats, oils, or grease into your sink or sewer.
- Do not over fertilize your lawn.
- Do not put pet waste down a storm drain.
- Do not pour household, automotive, or any non-stormwater waste down a storm drain.
- Pump your septic tank every 4 years.

Dog Owners

As the weather has gotten warmer, many of us will be spending more time outside, and many of us will want our pets to enjoy the nice weather and opportunities for play and exercise.

- Animals MUST be leashed on public property, such as streets, trails and parks. Animals cannot run at large.
- You are required to pick up after your pet.
- Animals must have an ID tag that indicates the owner's name, address, and phone number.

Weekly Yard Waste Cart Service Resumes This Month

Weekly curbside disposal of yard waste will resume April 1, weather permitting, and ends in November. Subscribers are billed \$95 annually for the 96-gallon cart and will see that amount added to their May bill. The fee is nonrefundable and covers one calendar year. Subscribers may also add a second yard waste cart for an additional \$35 per year.
